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# COLLEGE NEWSLETTER – 12TH JULY 2019

DEAR PARENTS & CARERS,

Welcome to the school's weekly newsletter.

This is the last parent newsletter of the 2018-19 academic year. I hope you have enjoyed receiving this weekly communication and I thank you for all the positive comments received about it.

It has been another interesting year at Lutterworth College. It is the year in which we sadly said goodbye to our partner school, Sir Frank Whittle Studio School. It was an establishment that was founded on solid altruistic principles and an excellent curriculum but unfortunately was never able to recruit the students necessary to make it financially viable going forward; and the Trust could no longer afford to take the project further. The future of the actual building is still undecided but, for the time being at least, it will temporarily house our English Faculty whilst their teaching block receives a new roof. This year was also the year in which the College had their long overdue inspection from the Church of England (SIAMS) and we were very pleased to receive a 'Good' grade – the full report now a matter of public record on our school's website. We also saw our last 'legacy cohort' of students through their GCSE examinations. Next year's Year 11 will be an eclectic mix of those students that joined the College (when I did) back in September 2015, those that have joined us along the way and students transferring from the Studio School's Year 10 cohort. Our Senior Deputy Head (Academic) Dom Lane will be responsible for ensuring the very best progress & outcomes for these students as we adjust our Year 11 cohort size from 88 students this year to 250+ students next year.

To update you on improvements to the school over the summer:

- A new roof will be put onto L Block (this is the block that faces the bus lanes at the front of school). The new roof will incorporate fire compartmentalisation in line with new safety regulations and although the work is due to commence this weekend it is not expected to be finished until well into the Autumn term hence the temporary move of the English Faculty to the Studio School building.
- A new covered area (Canopy) will be built on the ATP seating area (next to 'the shed') allowing an outside area that students can occupy during break and lunch times sheltered from the weather.
- New seating will go into both the main dining areas in D & S allowing these spaces to become more flexible for hirers and easier to clean.
- New student lockers will be based in and around S Block dining allowing the replacement of the old broken ones in the maths corridor – also creating more space for 'student traffic.'
- The Maths Faculty will get a new coat of paint in all the classrooms and shared areas it is desperately in need of it!
- New displays of old school photos will be proudly displayed in the Laurels and we will move our trophy cabinet to the heritage room in the Laurels.

I assure you that the school has not come into the money; far from it I'm afraid. All of the above is being achieved through a combination of bidding for improvement funds to central government, the 'little extras' capital fund and fundraising by the Friends of Lutterworth College (FOLC). Unfortunately the funding crisis for schools does extend into the heart of Lutterworth College – especially with our complex and dynamic estate – and it is challenging to see how these challenges will be met over the coming years. I have to take decisions daily

about where we can spend our limited resources and they are often unhealthy decisions between spending it on student resources, staff recruitment & retention, estate investment and the IT infrastructure. It is a challenge for all schools but for ours especially; it leaves me feeling extremely frustrated that there is just not enough money to put the investment where it is needed most – supporting student learning.

Nevertheless, I am extremely positive about the future of the school. We have been inspected twice, once by the government (OFSTED) and once by the church, (SIAMS) in the last two years and since I became headteacher. Both experiences have been very positive and recognised that the school is on a journey to excellence and being outstanding. For the last two years we have also been in the top three attaining schools in Leicestershire. In September we welcome another full cohort of 240 students into Year 7 from over 40 different primary schools. We have developed our Be CHRIST characteristics this year as we want all of our students to be: Courageous, Hardworking, Reflective, Inspiring, Supportive and Tenacious. The development of these key characteristics will be led, in the new year, by our Deputy Head (Pastoral) Stewart Shovlin.

As we look forward to next year we also will be celebrating the 140th year of educating young people at Lutterworth College in 2020. We will be marking this anniversary with some special events and activities. As always we look to our parents to get fully involved and support the school as much as possible. Educating young people today remains an absolute privilege – it is made so much easier when the school is supported by the parent body – we make a far more effective and formidable team when we work in partnership.

The nominated person will then need to bring the completed form with them on results day with some form of ID e.g. passport, driving licence etc.

# CHANGES TO SETTING

ENGLISH, MATHS AND SCIENCE

Next year, changes to the way in which we have timetabled our core subjects mean that some students' sets will have changed. We wanted to let you know how students are being set in each of the subjects to help clear up any confusion. If you have specific questions about the set into which your child has been placed, please contact their teacher(s) directly.

#### **English and Science**

In English and Science, students are taught in largely mixedability groups. There is some streaming by ability with particularly able students, and with those who we feel would benefit from smaller class sizes with additional support.

#### Maths

In Maths, students have been placed in groups with their peers who are working at similar levels. This has been based on target grades and the grades at which students are currently working following assessments that they have completed during the past year. Lessons in Maths are differentiated to ensure that students at all levels are stretched and challenged in their work to enable them to make progress.

### YEAR 7 INDUCTION

On Monday and Tuesday of the final week of this term we welcomed our new Year 7 students. They had an enjoyable two days at the College, meeting each other and school staff, and being introduced to their new mentor groups.

On Monday the students had the opportunity to sample a typical Maths, English and Science lesson. Also, students were invited to a talk by Mr Jeremy Dry from Maximise, a

guest speaker who gave the students some tips on how best to prepare for life at secondary school. I think the students found this extremely enjoyable as it was both amusing and helpful.

On Tuesday the new students were able to spend time in their Mentor groups sampling some of the activities that take place during Mentor period. This included a personal reading session which is a regular feature of these sessions. This was followed by a mini sports day and, because the weather was nice, a picnic on the field at lunchtime.

Mrs Knight and Mrs Bird, the Year 7 Pastoral managers, then said their farewells to the students as parents came to collect them at the end of two busy days.

All staff and students look forward to greeting the new Year 7 at the beginning of the new academic year.

And in that time I've seen literally thousands of young people learn, flourish and succeed in so many ways within Music lessons and extra-curricular activities – it has been a privilege to teach every one of them and I wish you all the very best for the future.

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### YEAR 9 GEOGRAPHY

LEICESTER FIELD WORK

On Monday 29th June, the geography department took all of the Year 9 geographers into Leicester to complete their first day of GCSE field work.

For their exam pupils are required to study how different areas have changed over time, and how cycles and flows impact an area. Our trip to Leicester gave us the perfect opportunity to study these two elements and provided the pupils' with first-hand experience of collecting geographical data outside of the classroom. The day started with a visit to Belgrave to allow data to be collected on an area which has changed significantly over time, largely due to migration. The pupils were able to see how this has influenced the businesses, housing and services of this part of the city. After a short coach transfer, our next stop was the St Matthew's Estate, which provided a clear contrast to Belgrave and gave an insight into how government housing policies of the mid to late 20th century completely changed the landscape of city centre living. Our final study area was the central business district which has undergone huge change in recent years due to significant investment and changes in the retail sector. This area of the city also introduced pupils to the idea of flows, and how different movements of pedestrians, vehicles and goods impact an urban environment and how these flows can be managed.

Despite the threat of thunderstorms, the weather stayed fair and the pupils conducted themselves maturely, working hard throughout the day and gaining lots of valuable information which will undoubtedly have a huge positive impact on their future studies.
