#### LUTTERWORTH COLLEGE GOLD DUKE OF EDINBURGH LEGACY PROJECT

As Gold Duke of Edinburgh participants, we are required to volunteer for a minimum of a 12-month period. In order to fulfil this, we proposed to help Mr Summers, the Headteacher, organise a legacy project to honour previous students at the school. In doing this, our aim was to leave a long-lasting legacy which highlights how the school has changed throughout its history since opening in 1880.

We thought the perfect way to portray the history of the school all audiences: students, parents and teachers was to display photographs of the college and its previous pupils around the site. (These are primarily found in the Laurels building, S block and near to the main staff room) Initially, we started with the task of gathering as many photos throughout the years from ex-pupils and staff, as well as advertising it in the Swift. From this, we had collected around 150 photographs ranging from early to mid-1900's up until current day.

Next was the big task of deciding how to organise the many photos we had collected. Originally we had organised each photo into chronological order however with the constant issue of missing years and discovering additional photos we had missed out throughout the months, we came to the conclusion that by mixing various years in no particular order gave a direct visual comparison of how the school has changed throughout the years. As you can imagine, with the photos being very old and fragile, many frames were broken, the glass was smashed or some simply did not have a frame at all.

With a substantial number of unusable frames, we took them to our local framers, "The Gallery," which some of you may know if you live in the Lutterworth area. The gentleman was a tremendous help in fixing and making all the frames custom-sized with a quick turnaround of one week. This meant we could move on quickly with the project.

In order to progress, we then measured each wall onto which we intended to mount photos and then scaled this onto the floor. For each wall, we had to arrange the photos in the position they fitted best making sure that the years were mixed. We numbered each photo to prevent duplicating photos. Next was the physical task of drawing around each photo on the wall and coordinating each drawing with the number. With 150 photos and only three of us, you can probably guess how many weeks this took us; taxiing the photos to and from the wall, finding the perfect space for each photo and essentially creating a blueprint of where the photos were to be mounted.

Over the summer, we arranged for a few extra hands to help put the photos on display, for which we would like to express our appreciation in taking on such a large task. After a year of organising and preparation, we now have a finished legacy project which can be seen throughout the school which we believe gives a fantastic celebration of the school's rich history.

Make sure you give it a look whenever you are next in the college and if you are an ex-pupil you may even spot yourself!

Year 12 student Tom Beamer has just taken part in the Swim England Winter Nationals. Tom has been a competitive swimmer for a number of years. He had an excellent competition which saw him qualify for three finals! Tom also writes a blog detailing his training and events. Here's what he had to say about this latest competition:

Last week I competed at the Swim England Winter Nationals in Sheffield. I competed in 5 events (200 free, 400 free, 100 back, 200 back and 400 IM) and managed to achieve

personal best times in every single swim I did! I also reached 3 Junior finals in the 400 IM, 400 free and 200 back where I placed 3rd, 4th and 5th respectively so overall I am very happy with my results from this competition. These nationals have acted as a massive confidence builder for me in myself and my ability and I hope to carry this confidence into the rest of the season. Next up for me is my first long course race of the season in Northampton on 20th December where I will be racing 400 free.

To further support Tom's training, he has been asked to train at Loughborough University each Wednesday. We are very proud of you Tom.

#### **BIKEABILITY**

Ten Year 7 students have taken part in Bikeability Level 3 cycle training. The students are now equipped to tackle a wider variety of traffic conditions and more challenging traffic situations. The course covered dealing with hazards, making 'on-the-move' risk assessments and planning routes for safer cycling.

The aims of the Level 3 course are to encourage and develop safe cycling skills, develop positive attitudes towards road use, increase knowledge and understanding of the road and traffic environment and to give students the confidence to use their bikes on longer journeys.

The training was delivered by three qualified National Standards Cycling Instructors employed by Leicestershire County Council. All students involved enjoyed the sessions and have been awarded a certificate and a badge.

Before starting at Lutterworth, in May, Cyra represented England at the JKA European Championships where she won a Bronze medal for individual kumite, at that time she became the only brown belt ever to be selected to represent England at an international event.
